

# **2016-17 Annual Report**

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### **MISSION STATEMENT**

The Chicano Studies Institute is dedicated to advancing knowledge on cultural practices, the historical development, the experiences of immigrants and related socio-economic conditions, education, and the health of Chicano-Latino population. The CSI accomplishes its mission by supporting research across disciplines focused on the Mexican and Mexican American experience as well as the broader Latino experience. Scholars and students from all disciplines pursue work that helps policy makers, fellow researchers, educators, service providers and the interested public better understand the most pressing issues pertaining to Chicana/o and Latina/o populations.



### **DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT**

Since its founding in 1969, the Chicano Studies Institute has played a pivotal role in facilitating scholarly research on the <u>Chicano/Latino</u> population. Through interdisciplinary and field-specific research, faculty and students from all disciplines have worked to enhance our understanding of Chicano/Latino cultural practices, historical development, socioeconomic conditions, educational achievement, health issues, neighborhood contexts of youth development, inequalities and other pressing issues that affect Latinos. The Institute is also dedicated to **co-sponsoring events or functions** that promote awareness and understanding of the broader Latino experience. The Institute assists in the recruitment and retention of Chicano/Latino graduate students and undergraduates at UCSB through programming.

### **SUBMITTED GRANTS**

Our staff assisted with many aspects of the grant submission process. Faculty apply for research funds from federal agencies, private organizations, and extramural research units. During 2016-17, CSI staff assisted with grant applications totaling \$726,955 to funding sources including the National Endowment of the Humanities, The Spencer Foundation, William T. Grant Foundation, UC Mexus and Santa Barbara County.

### **MANAGED GRANTS**

### Enhancing Latino Preschoolers' Kindergarten Readiness. National Institutes of Health Science Education Partnerships Award \$1,172,302 Project Period: 07/2012 - 06/2017

*Professors Romo, Okamoto, Bianchini, and Lee* from the Gevirtz Graduate School of Education completed their fifth year of funding from a National Institute of Health Science Education Partnership Award. The goal of the project is to design and test the efficacy of a preschool science program that teaches low-income Latino children about health concepts related to cold/flu prevention and nutrition. This project is being conducted in collaboration with the Franklin Children's Center in Santa Barbara. The science program addresses the need to provide Latino children with enriching experiences in early childhood that enhance their cognitive and language development. Latino children stand to benefit from exposure to instructional materials that foster critical thinking and enhances science inquiry skills in the early years of their educational trajectory, especially given that they begin kindergarten at a significant disadvantage compared to European American children.

#### Metrics and the Humanities in Higher Education. National Endowment for the Humanities

### \$174,416 Project Period: 10/2017 - 9/2019

*Professor Chris Newfield,* English Professor was awarded an NEH Collaborative Research Award for "The Limits of Numerical: Metrics and the Humanities in Higher Education". The project addresses learning assessment's emphasis on measurable outcomes which has become central to pedagogical practice for proponents and critics alike. It presents a case study of attempts to contextualize quantitative data with qualitative information and to develop metrics from the bottom up. Yet even as faculty collaborate in the creation of learning measures, assessment's focus on outcomes threatens to marginalize humanistic pedagogical approaches that stress learning as a process rather than a product and that seek innovative means of teaching today's diverse student populations.

### Family Literacy Project

### Santa Barbara Public Library

### \$12,172 Project Period: 4/2017 - 3/2018

Principal Investigator, *Rebeca Mireles Rios*, Professor in the Gevirtz Graduate School of Education was recently awarded funding by the City of Santa Barbara to conduct "An Ethnographic Study of Homework and Reading Programs: Student, Family and School Interactions". The program offers homework support and reading programs for local elementary school-age children and parents/caregivers at the library. UCSB undergraduate students provide children with academic assistance as well as learning opportunities for parents. Parents can sign up for adult literacy tutoring and observe the homework help that the undergraduate students collect data through ethnographic research methods, documenting the interactions between parents, students, and staff.

### The Sal Castro Memorial Bi-annual Conference

### UC Mexus

### \$1,500 Conference Date: 2/2017

*Professor Mario Garcia*, of the Chicana/o Studies received a UC Mexus award for "The Sal Castro memorial Bi-annual Conference on the Emerging Historiography of the Chicano Movement. The project takes advantage of the fact that more distance from the Chicano Movement years provides better perspectives on the "Movement" plus increased availability of "Movement" archival sources and the recognition of the historical importance of the "Movement" helps explain this growing interest among younger scholars. The conference will bring together 25 scholars who in two days will bring to light many new and exciting aspects of the Chicano Movement. There are no concurrent sessions so all participants will present and attend all of the presentations made by their colleagues.

# Motivating Latina High School Students to Pursue and Persist in STEM Majors UCOEP Faculty Outreach Grant

### \$11,626 Project Period: 1/2018 - 6/2019

*Professor Laura Romo* was awarded a UCOEP Faculty Outreach Award for "Motivating Latina High School Students to Pursue and Persist in STEM Majors: A Mentoring Program Led by UCSB Undergraduate Women." The Goal of this project is to create a program which will enable high-ability-STEM Latina high school students to receive mentoring from UCSB undergraduate women who are STEM majors. The undergraduate women will share stories of their journey from high school to college and conduct focus groups for the high school students to share concerns about potential challenges. Longitudinal data will be collected through interviews to assess the effectiveness of the mentoring program on students' motivation and also environmental factors that led to their decisions to

ultimately pursue or not pursue a STEM major. In addition, interview data will be conducted from the students' completion of their freshman year of college to understand factors that led to them persisting in the major.

### Theater Tour Projects.

### **Academic Senate Grant**

*Professor Carlos Morton* of Theater and Dance was granted an extension for his Teatro Tour into the 2016-17 academic year. Using techniques inspired by El Teatro Campesino and the San Francisco Mime Troupe, San Marcos high school students were exposed to a minimum of four hours per week of different theatrical activities. The High School students, under the guidance a UCSB Graduate Director and undergraduate students attended classes in improvisation and theater games that inspired them to create skits or "actos" that address issues of concern to at risk youth. They will learn how to utilize their "instruments," namely their voice and body that teaches them to speak in public in front of live audiences.

### Intervening to improve Latina mother-daughter conversations

### **Academic Senate Grant**

### \$7,000 Project period: 7/2017-6/2018

*Professor Laura Romo* was also awarded an Academic Senate Grant for the "Examining the longitudinal effects of a Latina mother-daughter dating/romantic relationship education intervention: A 5-year follow-up of the "Will Power, Won't Power" Program. The study was designed to evaluate the efficacy of a culturally-tailored program to improve Latina mother-daughter communication about dating and sexuality. In a previous study, Mexicanorigin mothers and their daughters participated in a joint mother-daughter program in which they learned information about contraceptives, pregnancy prevention, HIV transmission and HPV transmission, features of healthy and unhealthy partnered relationships and how to recognize signs of abuse. An Academic Senate Grant was awarded to follow-up with the participants.

### **Biography of Fr. Luis Olivares**

### **Academic Senate Grant**

### \$1,855 Project period: 7/16-6/17

*Professor Mario Garcia* continued his work on a biography of Fr. Luis Olivares and his role as a faith-based leader in Los Angeles in the 1970s and 1980s. Olivares, a member of the Catholic Claretian order, was ordained a priest in 1961. Exhibiting strong leadership skills and intelligence, Olivares rose quickly in his order and in the mid-1960s became treasurer of the Claretians. In 1975, he met farm labor leader César Chávez and became converted to his cause. Olivares became a strong supporter of the farm workers struggle for social

justice and human dignity. He also requested to be assigned to an East Los Angeles parish where he could minister to low-income Mexican Americans.

### "Teatro Lectura" Interdisciplinary Humanities Center \$4,000 1/2017-6/2017

In Spring of 2017 Professor Carlos Morton offered a new version of "Teatro Tour", "Teatro Lectura". Through the Department of Theater and Dance, UCSB students performed original scripts about issues relevant to high school students in Santa Barbara county. This new initiative is designed to instill a love of theater arts in the Latino community and involves partnerships with UCSB faculty, graduate students, community centers and San Marcos High School, Santa Barbara High Scholl and La Cuesta High School.

### The Green Initiative

### Office of Education Partnerships.

### \$3,700 Project period: 2/2017 - 3/2018

Six undergraduate students from the College of Engineering working with Professor Gerardo Aldana, Chair of Chicano Studies received a Green Initiative Award. Their project, under the Nepantla Techne Calpulli umbrella seeks to fuel creativity and encourage students to start thinking early about how they can actively participate in solving energy problems. Particularly, the students seek to successfully recharge a phone using a bicycle. They aim to stimulate learning by encouraging students to "add their own improvements to the design or look for other ways to charge their phones.

### **CSI SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS**

### **Dissertation Awards**

Of crucial importance is the Institute's role in training future generations of scholars equipped to tackle fundamentally important Chicano-Latino issues. The CSI runs a yearly dissertation grant competition to support Latino-focused research, scholarship and creative work of graduate students from all departments. These grants range from \$500 to \$2,500 and are awarded based on merit and need. In 2016, CSI awarded grants to 12 students from the various departments. As part of their award, the students are given computer lab space at the CSI. At the end of the award period, students will present their research at our dissertation award colloquium.

### 2016-17 Dissertation Awardees

New Heights Graduate-Undergraduate Mentoring Program



In recent years, the CSI has implemented several new initiatives to help UCSB meet its Hispanic Serving Institute mission to improve educational outcomes for Chicano/Latino undergraduate and graduate students. In Spring 2017, the Chicano Studies Institute initiated a collaboration with the Center for Black Studies Research (CBSR) and Student Affairs Academic Initiatives and put in place a one-quarter mentorship

program for sophomores. The New Heights Grad-Undergrad Mentoring Program took 57 sophomores of color to "new heights"--primarily first generation Chicano/Latino students and Black --allowing them to work in small groups with six graduate students from

similar backgrounds to explore the many opportunities available to help them succeed at a research university and reach their educational goals.

During the quarter, the undergraduates alternated between attending panel sessions or small group meetings every other week. The graduate students met at least twice with their mentees individually. The undergraduates worked with their mentors on assignments such as how to find research opportunities, and how to craft an email message to faculty expressing interest in their research. Other assignments included attending workshops at the Career Center and learning how to create a resume.

Survey responses and student comments from a post-program questionnaire showed that an overwhelming majority of the students benefitted from the experience. They reported increased confidence that they could succeed in the UCSB environment, both academically and socially. These findings were linked to different facets of the program including the quality of their mentoring relationship which was associated with students' signing up to participate on faculty research in the future. A great majority of the students reported intentions to seek career services and mental health services in the future. These trends provide supportive evidence of the value of ethnic-minority graduate-undergraduate student mentoring programs in encouraging students to gain research experience, reach out to faculty, and look out for their psychological well-being. #### **CSI Graduate Affiliates**

Seven CSI Graduate Affiliates worked with us to reboot the CSI Graduate Affiliate programs. This year our affiliates worked with us to achieve the following outcomes: 1) The CSI Graduate Affiliate Weekly Peer Writing and Review Group 2) Quarterly CSI Graduate Affiliate Planning Meetings 3) Identified topics for future seminar or workshops. #### **Proyecto Adalante**
